# Survey Shows Strong Opposition to FivePoint Development Measure Put on June 5th Ballot

# **Irvine Community Poll**

### Question:

Do you favor or oppose the City Council action to replace the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park with zoning for developer FivePoint to build 812,000 square feet of office and commercial development?

## Results

(first 500 respondents)

Favor 8.3%

Oppose 91.7%

Now headed for the June 5th ballot, the Zone-Change Ordinance adopted by the City Council on a 3-to-2 vote remains very unpopular among Irvine residents, according to the latest survey results from the Irvine Community Poll.

City ballot measure that would grant FivePoint Communities development rights to build massive office and industrial projects on the 125-acre site in the Great Park previously approved for a Veterans Cemetery is strongly opposed by Irvine residents, according a continuing citywide survey conducted by the Irvine Community Poll, an entity owned by Irvine Community News & Views.

#### June 5th ballot measure

Three City Councilmembers — Mayor Donald Wagner and Councilmembers Christina Shea and Melissa Fox — put the development measure on the June 5th ballot at the behest of multibillion-dollar corporate developer FivePoint. (Councilmembers Jeff Lalloway and Lynn Schott were opposed.)

FivePoint and its three-member Council majority have tried for months to present the ballot measure as simply a question of where to put the Veterans Cemetery — at its original site in the

Great Park or, miles away, on FivePoint property next to the I-5/I-405 freeway interchange, a site that the developer tries to make more attractive by referring to it as "the strawberry fields."

But the public doesn't seem to be buying what developer FivePoint is selling. By a remarkable 91.7 percent to 8.3 percent, residents say they are against the zoning ordinance that the City Council put on the June 5th ballot. Ordinance No. 17-08 is a massive, complicated City zone-change ordinance that is the central element in a development scheme enabling FivePoint to take ownership of the original Great Park Veterans Cemetery site (next to Irvine Boulevard) and build more than 800,000 square feet of office and industrial space. #### Development and traffic replacing Veterans Cemetery

The City-FivePoint ballot measure, if approved by Irvine voters, would permit a wide range

of office, commercial and industrial uses — everything from research and development to manufacturing, to large distribution centers and hundreds of support businesses, including auto repair, truck depots, and many more. Later "upzoning" by the City Council could allow for large apartment complexes, with up to 50 units per acre. The rezoning is expected to bring nearly 10,000 added auto and truck trips daily on Irvine Boulevard, Sand Canyon and Jeffrey.

If the ballot measure passes, FivePoint has said they would re-locate the planned Veterans Cemetery to their property alongside the I-5/I-405 interchange, 3 miles away from the Great Park Veterans Cemetery site. But unlike the Great Park site, FivePoint's proposed freeway site has not yet been studied; there have been no cost estimates; no planning has been done; and the site has not yet received even preliminary approvals from the State and federal governments.

#### Comments from Poll respondents

The open-ended design of the Irvine Community Poll, inviting extensive comments from Poll respondents, reveals widespread voter opposition to what many have called a "giveaway of our Great Park" to FivePoint, and a Council "sell-out" of Irvine veterans and all Irvine residents.

Daryl Brandino, a resident of north Irvine, commented: "I am fiercely against the decision made by the City Council to sell out Irvine's citizens and scrap the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park. The Cemetery would be a perfect way to show patriotism and preserve a lasting legacy."

Brandino didn't stop there. He added, "Another massive development project is clearly not needed. A message must be sent to our elected officials that it is their duty to listen to the people and not be influenced by major corporations. We need to set things right by voting against replacing the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park with development."

#### Pope reacts to Poll

Edward S. Pope is Chair of the committee to Save the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park, which is urging a NO vote on developer FivePoint's zone-change ordinance on the June 5th ballot. When asked about the Irvine Community Poll results, he said he was encouraged by the early survey results. But Pope,

himself a veteran, a retired high school teacher, and a 46-year resident of Irvine, was frank to say that the poll may not mean much. "Look," he said, "FivePoint is likely to spend millions in this campaign, just as they have in previous Irvine campaigns. They'll engage in lies, smears, and they'll purposely try to mislead and confuse the voters. Why? Because this corrupt, one-sided zone-change ordinance — to replace our planned Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park with massive development — is worth hundreds of millions of dollars in real estate profits to FivePoint. They obviously don't give a damn about the veterans."

Echoing his comments in the Ballot Argument that he and others have submitted, Pope said, "FivePoint is trying to bully their way into the Great Park and push the veterans and Veterans Cemetery out." Then, already in campaign mode, he added his campaign tag line: "We can't let them do it. Vote NO on June 5th!" ICNV

# "We Call B.S.!"

Te call B.S.!" That's what high school senior Emma Gonzalez and other surviving teenagers of the Valentine's Day mass shooting at Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida are saying to the "grownups" — to State legislators, the Governor, Members of Congress, and the President. They are especially "calling out" the craven politicians who take money from the gun lobby and other special interests and, in return, fail to safeguard the public.

#### The Corrupt Connection

Yes, We Call B.S.! It's time to call out the gun lobby and the stranglehold that they have on our politicians. But it's time that we also call out the entire corrupt connection between all kinds of powerful special interests and the cowardly elected officials they cultivate and manipulate. Let's be honest: This individual and institutional corruption is destroying American Democracy and representative government at every level of our society - nationally, statewide, and at the local level as well.

Yes, it's time that We Call B.S. on the corrupt connection that is at work here in Irvine, too. For years now, developer FivePoint

Communities has been running roughshod over Irvine citizens and our City government, getting Councilmembers to rubber-stamp and become cheerleaders for their wildly excessive development schemes.

Front and center, of course, is FivePoint's complicated "landswap" - really a land-swindle and land-grab - adopted by the City Council last year. On a 3-to-2 vote, with Councilmembers Jeff Lalloway and Lynn Schott dissenting, the Council voted to: first, abandon the State and Federally approved, and pre-125-acre Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park; second, transfer ownership of

the property in the Great Park from the City to FivePoint, along with major zone changes that replace the planned Veterans Cemetery with massive, high-intensity development -812,000 square feet of office, commercial,

manufacturing and industrial development that will bring 10,000 added daily auto and truck trips to Irvine Boulevard, Sand Canyon, Jeffrey, and other streets throughout Irvine; and third, re-locate the Veterans Cemetery to a faraway site, outside the Great Park, next to the busy, noisy, and polluted interchange of the I-5 and I-405 freeways.

Who is helped and who is hurt by this deal that Councilmember Schott has called a "giveaway" of our Great Park? Clearly, multibillion-dollar developer FivePoint is helped. Mayor Donald Wagner admitted as much when he said at a Council meeting last year, "FivePoint is going to make some money off of this. Yep. Yep.

Well, according to experts, what Wagner calls "some money" amounts to as much as \$500 million or more in quick real estate profits for FivePoint. And, at whose expense? At the expense of the people of Irvine - at the expense of Irvine veterans and their families, and all residents across the City who would lose the promised, beautiful 125-acre Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park, only to find it replaced with intense FivePoint development. Our beautiful Great Park will shrink by 125

Special losers in this "giveaway" are nearby residents, close to the Great Park, who will have to endure tremendous additional traffic. noise, and air pollution - and a diminished quality of life.

#### The Wagner-Shea-Fox Money Connection

Why would three Councilmembers -Mayor Don Wagner and Councilmembers Christina Shea and Melissa Fox - vote for such a lopsided development scheme, now known officially as Ordinance No. 17-08? The disturbing fact of the matter is that during the past two years, FivePoint and their business and corporate allies spent more than \$1 million to elect pro-developer Don Wagner as Mayor, to re-elect Christina Shea as Councilmember, and, more recently, to shower Councilmember Melissa Fox with thousands of dollars in donations and other political favors. Wagner, Shea and Fox, in turn, vote the FivePoint development agenda 100 percent of the time, regardless of how much it hurts the people of Irvine.

#### Will Irvine Voters Strike Back?

Teenagers in Parkland, Florida and across America are saying: "We Call B.S!" Here in Irvine, voters are fed up with the whole rotten land-grab scheme cooked up by FivePoint and the City Council. Citizens gathered 19,164 Irvine resident signatures to put Ordinance No. 17-08 on the June 5th ballot — for an up

> or down vote of the people. Irvine residents now have the chance to Say NO by Voting NO on June 5th. If a majority of Irvine voters recognize what Ordinance 17-08 is - a corrupt deal put together by and for FivePoint, aided and abetted by three members of the Irvine City Council who are beholden to the developer - they will Vote NO.

> The voters' message must be clear and unmistakable: We Call B.S.! NO. NO. NO. 

#### Free exhibition opening Sunday, March 4, 1-3pm. The exhibition runs through Sunday, May 13.



## Gun Violence in Schools — An ICNV Special Commentary

In the aftermath of the mass-shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, we at *ICNV* asked how our community newspaper could provide a constructive platform for addressing the scourge of gun violence in American schools. We called on three of our contributing writers to address the issue, offering their special perspectives and

suggestions. Carolyn Inmon writes a SchoolWatch column for ICNV. As a retired teacher, who taught K-12 and in community

college, Inmon brings a long-time educator's perspective to the gun violence issue. **Phyllis Agran** is a practicing pediatric gastroenterologist and Professor of Pediatrics at UCI Medical School. She is a nationally recognized expert in injury prevention and control, and writes her regular column for *ICNV*, titled **Rx for Child Health & Safety**. Former Irvine Mayor **Larry Agran** is a public interest attorney who writes a regular column, **CityWatch**, for *ICNV*. or most of my teaching career, public schools have been regarded as very safe places — for students, teachers and staff. Now, the appalling reality is that the growing number of gun violence incidents in our schools, including mass-shootings with semi-automatic weapons, are turning our public schools into unsafe workplaces, subject to mass-casualty violence at any moment. Teachers will do their fair share — and more — to ensure safety; they always have and they always will. But none of us signed up to be heroes in active shooter, mass-casualty situations. It's time for IUSD and the City of Irvine, as well as the Irvine Teachers Association to show some real leadership and engage students, parents, grandparents and other interested Irvine citizens in serious public hearings about what steps must be taken to enhance school safety. More School Resource Officers (police officers) in our schools? More secure entrances? More secure classrooms? Use of more real-time cameras? How about the City and IUSD taking a stance on national proposals to ban military-style assault weapons, as we've already done under State law in California?

t this point, the epidemic of gun violence in our schools has risen to the level of a national public health emergency. According to ABC News, since the Sandy Hook Elementary School massacre five years ago, there have been more than 200 school shooting incidents with more than 400 casualties. Clearly, the easy access to firearms — especially AR-15s and other semi-automatic, military-style assault weapons — has made it possible for shooters to kill many people in a matter of minutes.

These weapons, which have no purpose but to kill other humans, should be banished from civil society. Thanks to the extraordinary efforts of our own U.S. Senator Dianne Feinstein, assault weapons were banned in the U.S. from 1994 until 2004, when the Congress allowed the law to expire. Now, the national ban on assault weapons should be reinstated — perhaps coupled with a government-funded "buy-back" program — to get these weapons out of our local communities, states, and all channels of interstate commerce.

o, will this be the time that, finally, we achieve a re-instituted national ban on the sale or possession of AR-15s and other military-style assault weapons? Will we, at long last, make demonstrable progress to control gun violence nationally and improve gun safety everywhere?

The fact that this time — for the first time — high school students across America appear to be organizing a real movement, is cause for hope. These young activists have both the necessary energy and idealism; they don't yet suffer from cynicism; and their social media skills can be a huge advantage. My advice to these bright young activists? Be smart. Be strategic in your politics. Make it clear there are millions of you who will soon be voting, and that your mission is to hold all elected officials accountable for their actions — and for their inaction.

Here in Irvine, I'd pay special attention to the candidates in our own 45th Congressional District. (Irvine comprises about 40 percent of the entire 45th CD.) Mimi Walters, the incumbent Republican Congresswoman, has a long and dreadful record of opposing just about every sensible gun safety proposal — both when she was a State legislator and, in recent years, as a Member of Congress. She is running for re-election to Congress, facing a tough challenge — first, from a half-dozen Democratic candidates in the "top-two" June 5th primary. Then, one of them will be facing Walters in the November runoff election. My guess is that the gun control issue — especially where the candidates stand on banning AR-15s and other assault weapons nationwide — could be decisive in the 45th CD.



The City of Irvine has replied to ICNV's letter asking City officials to explain its plans to reduce Green House Gas (GHG) emissions. ICNV now responds to the City's letter.

On December 20, 2017, two of *ICNV*'s contributing science writers, Carl Mariz and Ed Sharman, sent an important letter to the Irvine City Manager. In their letter, Mariz and Sharman asked the following:

"California, with passage of Senate Bill 32 in 2016, has set a statewide target of 40 percent GHG reduction from 1990 levels by the year 2030. What does the City understand to be its obligations under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) to comply with this goal?"

On January 5, 2018, the City Manager responded with a comprehensive reply that Mariz, Sharman, and other ICNV science writers have analyzed with great care. Carl Mariz and Ed Sharman have since prepared, in letter form, a joint critique of the City's reported efforts. Their February 23rd letter to the City is reproduced below.

## Argument and Rebuttal for the June 5th Primary election

s ICNV has previously reported, 19,164 Irvine residents signed a Referendum Petition putting an Irvine Measure on the ballot, on Primary Election Day, June 5th, against developer FivePoint's massive development in the Great Park. The Ballot Measure will be Ordinance No. 17-08 that the City Council passed on October 10th to rezone, for 812,000 square feet of commercial and industrial development, the 125-acre Great Park site — a site with VA approval for a CalVet-designed Veterans Cemetery, which was slated to receive \$10 million of federal funds, and \$30 million of State construction funds. Below is the Argument AGAINST the Measure, and the REBUTTAL to the Argument that was submitted to the City Clerk by the supporters of the FivePoint "land-swap" scheme. (The Measure, not yet assigned a letter, is referred to, below, as Measure X.)

For the first time in decades, on June 5th Irvine voters will decide on the future growth and development of our City.

- Your **NO vote on Measure X** will STOP three Irvine City Councilmembers from giving away — to giant developer FivePoint Communities — the 125-acre site in the Great Park that our City dedicated four years ago for creation of a peaceful, beautiful Veterans Cemetery.
- · Your NO vote on Measure X will also STOP accompany- ing zone changes that permit FivePoint to build 812,000 square feet of massive office, commercial, manufacturing and industrial development in the Great Park, adding more than 8,000 car and truck trips every day on Irvine Boulevard, Sand Canyon, Jeffrey, and throughout Irvine.
- Your **NO vote on Measure X** will make sure the Southern California Veterans Cemetery is built in the Great Park, as planned, designed and approved by the City of Irvine, CalVet, and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. The project has been "construction-ready" for a year.

Most important: Your NO vote on Measure X paves the way for Councilmembers Jeff Lalloway and Lynn Schott to re-introduce their resolution to immediately commence construction of the Veterans Cemetery within the Great Park, as originally planned and promised. Once built, the Veterans Cemetery will be operated and maintained in perpetuity by the State, at no cost to the City.

Voter beware! Measure X, drafted for FivePoint's benefit by three pro-developer Councilmembers, will move the planned Veterans Cemetery three miles away — to FivePoint's deceitfully named "Strawberry Fields" site - at the I-405 and I-5 interchange, one of the busiest, most congested and polluted stretches of freeway in the nation.

## **REBUTTAL** to Argument in FAVOR of Adoption of Ordinance No. 17-08

Following Measure X's defeat on June 5th, Councilmembers Jeff Lalloway and Lynn Schott will re-introduce their resolution to immediately commence construction of the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park. #### Carolyn Inmon's SchoolWatch column cited in challenge to IUSD's election system

In a recent press release, IUSD Superintendent Terry Walker reported that the School District had received a letter from Malibu attorney Kevin Shenkman, alleging that IUSD's "at-large" system for electing School Board members was racially discriminatory, and violated the California Voting Rights Act.

In his letter, Shenkman wrote that if, by March 25th, IUSD didn't agree to "discuss a voluntary change" - moving from at-large elections of Board members to a system of geographically smaller, "single-member districts" -a lawsuit would likely be filed.

Schenkman cited ICNV's columnist, Carolyn Inmon, who wrote an article in her January SchoolWatch column entitled "Time for for a Change." In her article, Inmon pointed out that the current system was, in fact, concentrating Board representation in the northern part of Irvine, while the older areas and older schools elsewhere in the City were seriously underrepresented on the IUSD Board.
