
#### Two Issues Now at a Critical Stage

When we first began publishing Irvine Community News & Views in 2014, we focused our attention on two important issues — advocacy for a beautiful Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park; and advocacy for strong City growth-control policies to curb developer-driven runaway growth. Both issues are now at a critical stage.

Veterans Cemetery. Since 2014, the City has made great progress in realizing a shared dream — the establishment of a 125-acre Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery in Irvine's 1300-acre Great Park. With City support, followed by State and Federal approval, the project is now on the Federal "Priority List." The Veterans Cemetery could be built and operational by Veterans Day, 2019. However, Mayor Donald Wagner and Councilmember Christina Shea are leading a cynical effort — promoting a "landswap" scheme to move the Veterans Cemetery out of the Great Park and turn over the land to developer FivePoint Communities for private development and private profit. We cover the story from a number of angles on pages 1-3, including an Irvine Community Poll question, asking what YOU think.

#### **Progress Toward Veterans Cemetery**

### Partial Victory in Key Battle to Fund Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park



With new State funding, the Southern California Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery at the Great Park could soon be built and operational.

Initially approved by the Irvine City Council and State Legislature in 2014, the planned Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park is now on the federally-approved "Priority List" for funding and construction. With State and local funding, the officially designated Southern California Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery — on a 125-acre site within the Great Park — could be built and operational by Veterans Day, 2019.

ost Irvine City Council meetings are routine. Some involve important City business. And, every once in a while a Council meeting marks an historic turning point. The April 4th City Council meeting — and its aftermath — may have been just such a history-making event.

In a bold move to quickly gain the final State and Federal go-ahead for construction of the Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery on 125 acres within the Great Park, Councilmember Jeff Lalloway put on the agenda a proposal that the City Council authorize the expenditure of up to \$40 million in available Great Park development funds — enough to fund half of the estimated costs to construct Phase One of the project. Lalloway's motion set a goal of having the Veterans Cemetery operational by Veterans Day, 2019, just 30 months from now.

Under the Lalloway plan, the other half of the funding — up to \$40 million — would be expected to come from the State of California. In a letter to the Irvine City Council, Orange County Assemblywoman Sharon Quirk-Silva, who gained initial State approval of the project in 2014, has pledged to work with her colleagues in the Legislature and with Governor Jerry Brown to secure the necessary State funds.

The April 4th Council meeting took place in a crowded City Council Chamber. After more than two hours of public testimony and nearly an hour of City Council discussion, the Council voted 3-to-2 for Councilman Lalloway's motion. Lalloway and Councilmembers Lynn Schott and Melissa Fox voted YES, while Councilmember Christina Shea and Mayor Donald Wagner voted NO.

Then, in a bizarre twist, moments after the historic motion was approved, Councilmember Melissa Fox, who had spoken in favor of Lalloway's

Whether it was spontaneous — or the result of pressure from Mayor Wagner, or from Councilmember Christina Shea and lobbyists for developer FivePoint Communities — Fox said out loud that she was "confused," and then asked for help in cobbling together her own motion, which was pretty much a restatement of Lalloway's motion. However, Fox added a provision directing City staff to explore a "second track" for the Veterans Cemetery. Specifically, she asked that City staff be directed to meet with representatives from development company FivePoint Communities to discuss their controversial "land-swap" proposal, which Councilmember Shea has been pushing for more than a year.

The "land-swap," which some have derided as a "land swindle," involves moving the Veterans Cemetery to an entirely different and smaller site near the Irvine Train Station, while giving the 125-acre site in the Great Park to FivePoint for future private development and private profit.

Councilmember Lalloway repeatedly attacked the "land-swap" proposal as a thinly veiled entitlement scheme, which would result in FivePoint getting development rights to build 1,500 or even 2,000 new residential units on the 125-acre property, effectively reducing the size of the 1,300-acre Great Park by about 10 percent. And, of course, the Great Park would be without the Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery, the Great Park's "most important feature," according to Lalloway.

Experts have estimated the "land-swap" entitlement, and subsequent land sales to residential builders, could be worth many hundreds of millions of dollars to developer FivePoint Communities.

Lalloway referred to Fox's inclusion of the alternative "land-swap" provision in her motion as a "poison pill" that would send a mixed-message to the Legislature and Governor, and could jeopardize Irvine's chances of getting State funds for the City's originally designated 125-acre Great Park site.

Finally, Fox's motion passed, 3-to-2, with Councilmembers Lalloway and Schott voting NO.

In the days after the meeting, Lalloway conferred with Assemblywoman Sharon Quirk-Silva, who expressed confidence she could still win State funding approval for the Veterans Cemetery site in the Great Park. Another good sign was Governor Jerry Brown's announcement that he wanted to visit the City's designated Great Park site for the Veterans Cemetery, soon.

Meanwhile, in a further effort to derail the Veterans Cemetery, Councilmember Christina Shea sent a letter to the Governor, attacking the 125-acre Great Park Veterans Cemetery site, and pressing Brown to consider the "land-swap" deal being pushed by developer FivePoint Communities.

According to reports emanating from Sacramento, FivePoint president and CEO Emile Haddad, as well as other FivePoint officials and their team of lobbyists, have been walking the halls of the State Capitol, meeting with officials in the Governor's office and key leaders in the Legislature — all in an effort to kill the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park by killing State funding for the project. ## Are Irvine's City Council Meetings Rigged? by Angelo Vassos

As the principal staff photographer for Irvine Community News & Views (ICNV), I was assigned to get some good photographs of the April 4th City Council meeting at City Hall. The big issue on the meeting agenda was Councilman Jeff Lalloway's proposal to commit up to \$40 million from the \$300 million Great Park development fund in order to expedite construction of the 125-acre Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery in the Great Park.

As a veteran myself, I had planned to attend the meeting anyway to testify in favor of the State and Federally-approved Veterans Cemetery, which I did.

As the hearing on the Veterans Cemetery wore on, I noticed something peculiar about the behavior of the Mayor and other Councilmembers at the dais — they seemed to be more interested in receiving and sending text messages than in paying attention to the many citizens who came to the meeting and testified.

Here is something else I noticed: Mayor Donald Wagner and two Councilmembers — Christina Shea and Melissa Fox — seemed to be furiously text-messaging with certain people in the audience,

including Patrick Strader, who is the chief political operative and lobbyist for FivePoint Communities, the development company that has been trying to derail the Veterans Cemetery at the Great Park. (This is the same company, under the leadership of its president and CEO, Emile Haddad, that organized and bankrolled a \$1.5 million campaign in 2016 to smear other candidates and elect Don Wagner mayor and re-elect Councilwoman Christina Shea.)

As for Councilmember Melissa Fox, at a critical point in the meeting, she was obviously so mixed up and distracted by all the texting that she first voted for the Lalloway \$40 million Great Park Veterans Cemetery proposal, which passed 3-to-2 (Wagner and Shea voted NO) but then, moments later, she asked to "reconsider" her vote. Apparently, she was receiving text messages with instructions to present a new motion that included direction to

City staff to also explore a "second track" for the Veterans Cemetery

Tell, it looks like 2017 is going to be a "make-or-break" year for the Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery in the Great Park. Just three years ago, in 2014 when I was in my last year as an Irvine City Councilmember, I was proud to offer the Council resolution — unanimously supported — to have the City designate 125 acres within the Great Park (about 10 percent of the entire Great Park) for a Veterans Cemetery.

This generous City action, in turn, enabled Assemblywoman Sharon Quirk-Silva — then Chair of the State Assembly Veterans Affairs Committee — to win legislative approval that officially provided State support for the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park. The combined City and State action led to a plan and design for

the Veterans Cemetery; followed by an on-time application for approval by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs; and now a position on the "Priority List" for Federal funding.

But how could we accelerate the actual funding and construction of the Veterans Cemetery? Here's where leadership matters. Councilmember Jeff Lalloway began working with Assemblywoman Sharon Quirk-Silva to develop a funding plan: The City would pledge to put up half of the funds to build the \$77 million Veterans Cemetery — roughly \$40 million from the more than \$250 million Great Park development fund; and Silva pledged she would work to have the State match the City's effort.

Lalloway's proposal made it through the Council on April 4th, but not before Councilmember Christina Shea and Mayor Donald Wagner did everything in their power to derail it — and Councilmember Melissa Fox added language that inexplicably kept a "land-swap" proposal alive as a possible "second track" alternative site for the Veterans Cemetery.

Lalloway repeatedly noted that the "land-swap" was simply a land-and-entitlement grab worth hundreds of millions of dollars — it would enable developer FivePoint Communities to build 1,500 or even 2,000 more homes on the hallowed 125 acres that, in 2014, had been designated for the Veterans Cemetery.

Councilmember Lynn Schott, soft-spoken yet articulate and logical, noted that it was important to



remain on course and build the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park, as planned. As I watched Shea and Wagner doing everything they

could to promote the interests of developer FivePoint Communities and their allies, I actually found the spectacle sickening. These are the same developers that spent well over \$1 million

Lalloway began working with Assemblywoman to elect Wagner and re-elect Shea just last November.

For once, wouldn't it be wonderful if Shea and Wagner stood up for Irvine residents and American veterans, and put our interests ahead of yet another land-entitlement giveaway to FivePoint Communities, further enriching their big-bucks campaign donors.

That's something to think about as the most solemn of American holidays approaches, Memorial Day, when we honor all who served but especially those who, in President Lincoln's words, "gave the last full measure of devotion" to our country.

Here in Irvine, let's devote ourselves to rejecting developer-driven "land-swaps" and other get-rich-quick entitlement schemes. Instead, let's push forward to put the Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery where it belongs — in the Great Park...and as soon as possible!

Cemetery out of the Great Park and give FivePoint new entitlement for development. This could include as many as 2,000 additional houses on what is now the City-owned 125 acres of land *in* the Great Park, designated in 2014 for a Veterans Cemetery.

The new Fox motion appeared to be offered at the behest of FivePoint Communities. Fox's "second track"

motion was labeled a "poison pill" by Councilmember Jeff Lalloway, who said that it could jeopardize State and Federal funding for the Veterans Cemetery. Fox's motion passed, 3-to-2; Councilmembers Jeff Lalloway and Lynn Schott voted NO.

Many who favored the 125-acre Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery in the Great Park left the City Council meeting angry and disgusted. *Public hearings* are for the benefit of the *public* in our local democracy. The idea is that we all listen to one another at the same time, in full *public* view, and then there is a *public* vote. But, instead, what is going on now is incessant text-messaging between Councilmembers.

This may be a violation of California's Brown Act, the State "open meetings" law that bars Councilmembers from secretly orchestrating or rigging the outcome of a public vote on a City Council agenda.

Also, it appears that the Mayor and Councilmembers — during a City Council hearing — are getting secret, texted instructions from lobbyists and others telling them what to do. To me and to many Irvine citizens, Wagner, Shea and Fox appeared to be shills for developer FivePoint Communities and their chief political operative at the meeting, Patrick Strader.

I hope we're going to get the full story of what really happened at the April 4th City Council meeting. I was happy to learn some days after the meeting that Dr. Harvey Liss, an Irvine citizen-activist and ICNV investigative journalist who was also present at the meeting, has submitted an official, written Public Records Act request — requesting a printed record of all the text messages sent and received by Mayor Wagner and City Councilmembers Christina Shea and Melissa Fox during the 4-hour City Council hearing on the Veterans Cemetery issue.

Let's see what Dr. Liss learns in the weeks ahead — I hope and trust that whatever it is, he will share it with the public.

### A School Nurse for Every School!

As a practicing pediatrician, I long ago learned about the wonderful work that

school nurses do every day to improve the lives of children and families. For example:

- > A school nurse quickly intervened after discovering that a child with diabetes could not afford her medication, so she was using another family member's medicine, until there was no more and the girl was in a diabetic crisis.
- Another child had an allergic reaction to peanuts that required immediate attention by a school nurse.
- > A school nurse, who just happened to be at one of her three schools that day, saved the life of a child whose heart stopped, by performing immediate CPR.

There is no doubt that a full-time, professionally trained school nurse benefits students, parents, teachers and the entire community by not only providing immediate interventions to address medical crises, but also by getting to know students and their families helping to provide health education and ensure optimum healthcare.

I'm a member of Irvine Unified School District's (IUSD) Medical Advisory Committee. At a recent meeting, IUSD school nurse Maria Otramba commented on what a difference it has made to families, children and staff now that she is a full-time nurse assigned to just one school, Meadow Park Elementary School in Irvine. According to Otramba, "If we're assigned to cover three schools, we move on

to a new school each day, with new fires to put out." Clearly, the one-nurse, one-school formula provides for optimum outcomes.

Just consider the enormous responsibilities of a school nurse. She/He is responsible for acute interventions, health surveillance, chronic disease management, emergency preparedness, behavioral health, health education, extensive case management, and doing what is needed to promote daily school attendance.

In her first year, school nurse Maria Otramba was astonished by the magnitude of severe food allergies among the students, many requiring emergency epinephrine injections. The second year she focused on the full extent of mental health issues in our schools and the work that's needed to be done to connect the school, community pediatricians, and mental health professionals to secure timely mental health services for individual students. Now in her third year, Otramba is determined to make the entire Irvine community aware of the complexity of medical issues and needs facing so many Irvine children and families.

As the number of children with special medical and educational needs increases, it becomes critical that we support our school nurses. Teachers can focus on teaching, while school nurses focus on health issues that impair learning.

The American Academy of Pediatrics advocates for school staffing that provides for one full-time professional school nurse in every school. This is a remarkably effective way to promote and ensure good academic outcomes, as well as good health. (You can read the AAP policy at: https://shar.es/1FfFXc).

Measure BB, a local initiative authored by my husband, former Irvine Mayor Larry Agran; signed by 18,000 Irvine voters to qualify for the ballot; and approved by 70 percent of Irvine voters in 2012, provided City funds to significantly increase the number of school nurses in Irvine. While the City Council continues to support the provisions of Measure BB, local pediatricians stand ready to advocate that Irvine move toward an important goal that can be summed up quite simply: One-Nurse, One-School -A School Nurse for Every School!


