Citizens Launch Ballot Referendum Campaign

"Save the Great Park Veterans Cemetery!"

On Friday, October 13th, a newlyformed, citizen-led committee to "Save the Veterans Cemetery" launched an audacious campaign to collect 12,000 Irvine voter signatures on a Referendum Petition. The purpose of the Referendum Petition campaign is to overturn an Irvine City Council ordinance that rezoned the site of the Great Park Veterans Cemetery, replacing the Veterans Cemetery with huge office and commercial development. The launch of the campaign is apparently a broad-based citizen reaction to the very unpopular City Council land-use decision.

A Shocking Vote

At a hastily called June 6th City Council meeting, and again at an October 10th Council meeting, Irvine City Councilwoman Melissa Fox shocked her former supporters by voting to abandon the City's 4-year-old project to build a Stateapproved, 125-acre Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park. Fox joined Mayor Donald Wagner and Councilwoman Christina Shea to, instead, vote for a complicated "land-swap" and zone change that will enable developer FivePoint Communities to take ownership of what has been the Great Park Veterans Cemetery site and build massive office complexes and commercial projects on the property.

The City Council votes on the FivePoint deal have been 3-to-2, with Councilmembers Jeff Lalloway and Lynn Schott voting NO. Schott has described the transfer of ownership and accompanying zone change ordinance as a "giveaway of our Great Park" to FivePoint. In fact, the loss of the 125-acre Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park would shrink the Park's size by 10 percent.

Councilman Lalloway decried the Council action as a thinly veiled land-grab by FivePoint to secure valuable "entitlement" to intensively develop the 125-acre site, producing a windfall profit of \$500 million or more for the developer. Lalloway noted the windfall profit was going to be at the expense of the entire Irvine community. The FivePoint plans call for 812,000 square feet of office and


commercial development, generating nearly 10,000 cars and trucks on Irvine streets every day, producing yet worse traffic jams and air pollution throughout the City.

Patty Bartlett, Chair of the Irvine Planning Commission, recently called the FivePoint entitlement and development plans as "incompatible" with the Great Park Master Plan and the surrounding residential neighborhoods.

A Lawsuit and a Referendum

Testifying against the zone change ordinance that would authorize the FivePoint office and commercial development of what has been the Great Park Veterans Cemetery site, former Mayor Larry Agran, a public interest environmental defense lawyer, has said: "The development on the scale contemplated by FivePoint Communities requires an entirely new, comprehensive Environmental Impact Report (EIR) that includes not only a thorough analysis of traffic, but also an examination of local air pollution and toxic contamination from long-ago military operations." Agran warned that the Council's disregard of proper procedures and the requirements of the California Environmental

Quality Act (CEQA) were sure to invite a lawsuit against the City.



In an official announcement of the Referendum campaign, Pope said, "This past June 6th — just 10 days before the State of California was scheduled to send \$30 million to our City to start construction of the 125-acre Veterans Cemetery in the tranquil and beautiful Great Park — the Irvine City Council suddenly voted to abandon the project." He added, "This dishonors our veterans."

Pope, himself a U.S. Army veteran, described the challenge ahead: "We only have until November 8th to gather the 12,000 signatures

necessary on our Referendum Petition to stop this travesty and restore Irvine's promise to Orange County veterans — by empowering the citizens of Irvine to vote on the Veterans Cemetery project at the next City election. I have great faith in my fellow Irvine residents and am confident that our Referendum Petition campaign will be successful."

Ed Pope — who is a U.S. Army veteran, a longtime Irvine resident, and a retired Orange County "Teacher of the Year" — issued a formal statement announcing the launch of the Veterans Cemetery Referendum campaign.

This past June 6th — just 10 days before the State of California was scheduled to send \$30 million to our City to start construction of the 125-acre Veterans Cemetery in the tranquil and beautiful Great Park, the Irvine City Council suddenly voted (3-to-2) to abandon the project. Instead, the Council decided to hand the cemetery site over to megadeveloper FivePoint Communities. The Council also granted FivePoint "entitlement" to develop the 125-acre parcel with huge office and commercial projects. In return, FivePoint wants to see the Veterans Cemetery built at the El Toro "Y" — a grossly inferior site alongside two major freeways (I-5 and I-405).

As a veteran who has called Irvine home for 45 years, I am outraged by this so-called "land-swap" scheme that dishonors our veterans and enables developer FivePoint to extract hundreds of millions of dollars in windfall profits. Their scheme is to grab this Great Park property that was dedicated by previous City Councils for a Veterans Cemetery, and then quickly develop it in ways that are totally incompatible with the Great Park and surrounding residential neighborhoods. In fact, the FivePoint development scheme would generate 10,000 car and truck trips every day, adding to the already terrible traffic and environmental issues facing our City.

We only have until November 8th to gather the signatures necessary on our Referendum Petition to STOP this travesty, and restore Irvine's promise to Orange County veterans — by empowering the citizens of Irvine to vote on the Veterans Cemetery project. I have great faith in my fellow Irvine residents and am confident that our Referendum Petition campaign will be successful.

Save the Great Park Veterans Cemetery and Say NO to FivePoint's Development Scheme

I've been thinking about an old saying that was popular among civic activists and reformers in the 1970s: "If the people will lead, the leaders will follow." That prodemocracy adage is being put to the test here in Irvine with the remarkable Veterans Cemetery Referendum Petition now in circulation throughout the City.

The citizen-led Referendum campaign is in reaction to a City Council majority — Mayor Donald Wagner and Councilmembers Christina Shea and Melissa Fox — that seems determined to do everything it can to please developer FivePoint Communities, while ignoring the wishes and aspirations of veterans, their families, and the entire Irvine community. How else can you explain a Council vote (3to-2) to abandon more than three years of planning and all the State and Federal approvals for the Veterans Cemetery in the Great Park; the rejection of \$30 million in State funds to immediately begin construction of the Great Park Veterans Cemetery; and then the proposed transfer of the land to FivePoint, along with a zone change ordinance that would permit FivePoint to put massive office and commercial developments on the property that was intended to be a beautiful Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery within our Great Park.

This is where the right of referendum comes in. More than 100 years ago, reformers in

California wrote the right of referendum into our State Constitution. Along with the right of initiative, the referendum is a form of direct democracy — allowing citizens to organize to

of special interests. Specifically, the right of initiative enables citizens to write their own laws and, if they can gather enough signatures, put their proposed laws on the ballot so the voters can decide. The referendum enables citizens to overturn bad laws or ordinances ... again, if they can gather enough signatures to qualify for the ballot.

So, here in Irvine, dozens of volunteers are now working day and night to gather 12,000 Irvine voter signatures by November 8th — to qualify the Veterans Cemetery Referendum for the ballot. This would give Irvine voters the opportunity to overturn

the very bad zone change ordinance that was enacted by the Council to give away 125 acres of our Great Park to FivePoint for intensive office and commercial development.

Irvine's Remarkably Wide Variety of Senior Services

'm new to Irvine's Senior Services. Having lived in Irvine for more than 40 years, I never associated myself with anything Senior and would toss into the trash any mail with the word "Senior" on it. (I didn't want to age gracefully. I didn't feel I was aging, at all!) Now that I'm 75 years old, and rather far into "seniorhood," I don't mind the term, so much.

I'm learning that many of Irvine's Senior Services are intended for healthy and active seniors, and

they are great bargains, such as the well-equipped Fitness Centers at the Rancho and Trabuco Centers (which are for everyone to get fit, not just

In mid-September, I visited the Rancho Senior Center to apply for my Irvine Senior Services (ISS) Gold Card (\$10), and also my membership card (\$55 and a super-bargain) for the Fitness Centers at the Trabuco Center (TC) and Rancho Senior Center (RSC). I also paid a \$10 fee for a Fitness Center orientation that I attended a few days later. A couple of weeks later my ISS Gold Card arrived in the mail

I want to especially point out the Keen Center for Senior Resources, located right next to the Lakeview Senior Center (LSC), in Woodbridge. The LSC provides an amazing array of free assistance programs ranging from Adult Day Health Care Services to Transportation, Financial Investment Counseling and Legal Consultation. There are, no doubt, thousands of seniors in Irvine who could

benefit from the remarkable services available to them that will improve every aspect of their quality of life. I am one of these seniors whose eyes have been opened. In fact, I now have my eye on the Timeless Tappers, offered at the RSC...to learn tap dancing! I'll soon be calling the RSC to find out where I buy my tap shoes!

I want to take a moment to emphasize that some sort of aerobic exercise and weight-bearing exercise is essential for preventing and also actually curing a large variety of chronic diseases. And this is not just my opinion. It is supported by many excellent research articles, and this awareness seems to be spreading. but not fast enough. Check out my online postings at: IrvineCommunityNews. org/senior-life-resources.

Note that you don't have to be a gym bunny to benefit from exercise. A half-hour per day of whatever you find to your liking will do the trick. I prefer

the treadmill because I can get a great amount of reading done. That's because walking on the treadmill requires no mental focus. For maximum benefit, you should set the treadmill at a comfortable slope, gradually increasing it as the months or years go by. You can also have the machine controlled by programs that automatically vary the slope and speed as you "walk." But, I've never used that feature, preferring to gradually increase the speed and slope manually, to my max, and leaving it there. In any case, the variable slope is a huge advantage of the treadmill over walking outdoors (unless you run, or walk in a hilly area). It took a couple of years of gradually increasing slope for me to walk at my current 12% slope, and my reading material is my companion.


If you prefer human companions, and don't have a partner or friends with whom to walk (strenuously, I hope), join the Senior Striders on Tuesdays and Fridays from 8:30am to 9:30am at the Trabuco Center. It's free.

Check out the large variety of activities available, from dance to yoga, and from canasta to Mah Jongg (though not particularly fitness enhancing) in the Irvine Senior Connection, published bi-monthly by the City, and available free at all Senior Centers. Or, go to: CityOfIrvine.org/senior-services.

For best information, call one of the three Senior Centers and you will

talk to very helpful and friendly staff. (See inset.)



resident, is a dual board-certified Pediatrician and Pediatric Sports Medicine specialist, affiliated with ActiveKidMD in Anaheim Hills. do we see injuries in sports? And what are their causes?

A. Sports injuries occur under a number of circumstances, and fall into several categories. For example, I've found that a remarkable number of injuries occur when an athlete is not wearing

appropriate protective equipment. Bike helmets do no good when they are strapped to the handlebars, just like shin guards cannot work if they are left in the gym bag. I tell athletes and their parents — to make sure their equipment is in good condition, that it fits well (especially with growing children), and that it is always properly used.

Q. What are some of the other risk factors for sports injuries?

A. Typically, many sports injuries occur within 30 days of undertaking a new season or a new activity. Good studies on Marine recruits show that foot stress fractures are most commonly seen three weeks into boot camp. My experience with young athletes is quite similar — about three weeks into a new sport, I will start to see overuse injuries. The body is unable to handle the stress of a new activity, and breakdown occurs. The answer to this problem? Prepare for a new sports activity with light conditioning. Going straight into football with double-workout days on the field can be a recipe for disaster. Also, start slow and increase intensity or length of workouts slowly in order to allow the body to adjust. And don't forget those rest days!

Q. What advice can you give to parents of kids who are "sports crazy" - and seem to be taking on too much?

A. Young, enthusiastic athletes rarely have the judgment needed to reduce the risks of injury. That's where good coaching, good parenting, and common sense come into play. Kids are at risk when they are playing more than one sport at a time; or when they are playing just too much of one sport. They are also at risk when they step up to a higher level of sports competition, playing with older and bigger athletes; or when they enroll in an intense sports camp; or start high school or college training. No matter what success the young athlete has enjoyed in the past, these situations can overtax a young body. Sports medicine physicians are mindful of a mantra that coaches and parents should take to heart as well: Too Much, Too Fast, Too Soon is a recipe for overuse injuries.

Appropriate sports activities can be terrific for kids — and grownups too — in building strong bodies, good health, and good character. The idea is to enjoy sports while avoiding sports injuries.

TUSD Reforms Its Elections...IUSD Should Do the Same by Carolyn Inmon

As I reported in my last column, the Tustin Unified School District (TUSD), which administers four schools in Irvine, recently committed to reforming its process for

electing its five School Board members, beginning in 2018.

TUSD will be transitioning from the old "at-large" election system to election of Board members "by-area" — five smaller geographic areas to ensure fairer representation. In the case of Irvine families with school kids attending TUSD schools located in the northern parts of Irvine — Hicks Canyon Elementary, Myford Elementary, Orchard Hills Elementary & Middle School, and Beckman High School — this new system will ensure that these Irvine families have their "own" school board representative.

I recently spoke with TUSD Communications Director Mark Eliot, who told me, "This will be the biggest change in how TUSD does business since its inception." He seemed to enthusiastically embrace the new system, which should provide for fairer representation of the District's geographically and ethnically diverse populations.

With 33,500 students, Irvine Unified School District (IUSD) is the 25th largest School District in California, and one of the few large districts to still choose its five Board members in at-large elections. Isn't it time for IUSD to reform how its Board members are elected, by going to a by-area system? What would it mean if IUSD made this change? More voices in the

community would be heard because citizens will have a better opportunity to communicate with "their" School Board member. In a City as large as ours, each Irvine neighborhood deserves to be represented by someone who is from that area and is likely to become an expert on its schools. This is especially true for the older parts of town, where the schools may require larger budgets for maintenance, repairs and modernization — and they need a School Board member from the area who will press the rest of the Board for greater equity in the allocation of School District resources.

Elections by area would bring greater diversity to the School Board. As intended and required by the California Voting Rights Act of 2001, in moving from at-large elections to elections by smaller areas, the Irvine School Board would not only be more representative geographically, but it would likely reflect more racial and ethnic diversity among elected Board members as well. Right now, even though Irvine is a remarkably diverse community with about 60 percent of the City non-white - all five School Board members are white, and three come from the same part of town, north Irvine.

The Tustin Unified School Board decided to transition from at-large elections to elections by-area — voluntarily and constructively — rather than having to fight a lawsuit under the California Voting Rights Act. Let's hope that IUSD Board members give consideration to adopting and implementing election reforms before being forced to do so by others.

Global Warming in Irvine: Now, It's Personal! by Ed Sharman

or quite some time, global warming — although real enough — seemed to me to be a rather abstract and far-off threat, both in time and space. Okay, ■ I get it! Glaciers melt and turn into gully-washers; the Arctic Ocean ice is melting; and U.S. forests from the Rockies, west, are dying from heat stress and beetles. But otherwise, the 'bad stuff' won't be much in evidence close by until my grandchildren are grown. Move on

As a matter of fact, global warming has lately become very up-front and personal for me, with real, immediate and expensive consequences.

Global warming's first impact in my life was merely a fun observation from my backyard. Back in the 1980s, the coral tree there regularly lost its leaves for a couple of months in the winter (during which time a dusting of frost on the lawn or my neighbor's roof occasionally appeared in the early morning, as well). Now my coral tree is an evergreen! In some years, the leaves are sparser in the winter, but the branches are never truly bare, and frost is a distant memory. Benign enough events, but I should have recognized them as a serious wakeup call!

First Consequence

The first high-impact consequence came just recently. My house came without mechanical air conditioning, and all through the 1980s, 90s and 00s I used to joke that "my air conditioner is the Pacific Ocean." And in truth, the onshore ocean breezes kept my Irvine house perfectly comfortable. Later, however, it seemed that there were longer and longer periods when the house felt a bit too warm, but still sufferable. The breaking point came two summers ago when it became too hot to sleep even with no sheets on for a solid two weeks or so - a veritable eternity! So, at a cost of thousands of dollars, I installed air conditioning, and - pained by much higher electric bills — now find it necessary to use it 1-2 months out of the year.

Second Consequence

A second big-consequence event occurred last year. Many years ago, I acquired a couple of acres of nicely forested land in the Sierra foothills with the idea of possibly building a vacation home there. The tall, prime-of-life ponderosa and sugar pines were gorgeous, and so cool to walk under, especially in summer! Imagine my shock upon receiving notice from the electric company that some of these trees had died and would have to be removed. A short time later a neighbor sent me a horrifying photo showing that all my pines had died within the last year along with a polite inquiry as to what I intended to do.


Well, I consoled myself, "At least I'll be able to salvage the trees for lumber or firewood and probably break-even cost-wise." Then, the reality of "western pine forests in the U.S. are dying," hit home: loggers and tree-cutters are overwhelmed with dead and dying pines; there's no market for my wood and it would have to be trucked off to a (gasp) landfill, at a very substantial cost.

I truly hope you're lucky, and global warming does no more than induce your once-deciduous tree to provide shade all year 'round, as mine now does. But be forewarned by my experience: sooner rather than later, the consequences of climate change in your own life may be much more impactful and costly than you expect!


